

The year 1986 will become for each of you, as time goes on, one of the dates in your life you will always remember.



Arab Club




ARAB CLUB

CHEERLEADING






TAU ALPHA PI NATIONAL HONOR SOCIETY

WOMEN'S SOFTBALL






Cross Country






WOMEN'S TENNIS

The College of Staten Island added some sparkle to an already illustrious 10-year history last night when it rolled past York College 93-59 to a perfect City University of New York Conference season.

The undefeated (14-0) CUNY campaign was a first for the Dolphins and the only time any team accomplished that feat since CSI joined the conference.

The victory was also CSI's 18th straight against CUNY teams over a two-year period. CSI won its final regular-season game in 1984-85 and then won three times en route to the CUNY tournament title.

"Winning the tournament again is our next goal," coach Tom Keenan said after CSI boosted its overall record to 19-8.

"And I know the logical thing for me to say is our biggest worry is a letdown, but I don't see that happening with these kids.

"They like to play basketball too much ... to win too much," the coach said and then added with big grin:

"I think they would like to win the tournament in front of all those people who don't want to see them win."

CSI made the better part of last night's game anticlimactic.

While York struggled and then completely lost its composure against all manner of pressure defenses, the home club rode a superlative opening 12 minutes from Tony Petosa to a 28-8 lead and never looked back.

Petosa, a 6-6 senior starting his final regularseason game at home, had a point a minute before Keenan put him on the bench alongside three other starters.

But neither his absence, nor that of Ron Chase, Gerard Nicholson and Tom Hannafin slowed the onslaught.

With backup point guard Mike Marcotte providing direction and reserves John Wolfe, Willie White and Jim Long providing quality minutes, CSI went to the lockers with a 24-point lead, 45-21.

"I thought our offense was sensational in the first half," Keenan said.

The Dolphins were a little less than that immediately after intermission.

York's big man, Elliot Bruce, returned to the floor

after spending much of the first half on the bench in foul trouble. The Nomads got the second half's first five points, enough of a string to arouse Chase, who had been invisible on offense in the first half.

The 6-2 senior answered York's opening burst with two quick baskets, scored two of his team's next four buckets, and assisted on another. With 5:29 gone in the half, CSI was in front 57-31 and impatient for the post-game celebration. 



WOMEN'S BASKETBALL






Class Motto, January 1986
