There are many programs, and student organizations that still suffer due to the lack of this funding. We need to purge our campus of political opportunists, and demand STUDENT CONTROL OVER STUDENT FUNDS!

IMPROVEMENT OF THE LIBRARY AND GYM FACILITIES

The CSI library is currently ranked second to last among all of CUNY in book volume. Our students have had great difficulty in finding the appropriate research materials due to the lack of these resouces. Our

current Student Government representives, that are running with United Students, have already begun to combat this problem by recently allocating 10 thousand dollars for books and journals to facilitate our library. The Gym facilities have also seen a rapid decline, especially in the weight room. Students have reported broken, missing, warn out equipment and machinery, creating hazardous conditions for our students.

CREATE AN ATMOSPHERE OF POSITIVE MULTI-CULTURALISM

The present Student Government has worked hard to restore race relations that had been almost completely distroyed through political provocation's of the past. One of the greatest benefits of being a student who attends CUNY is the diversity of this institution. Instead of students going off into their own little cliques, we should utilize the opportunity to learn from, and about each other. We need to foster programs and activities that will unify the student body across ethnic lines, and to celebrate all the strands of diversity existing within our campus. We believe that positive multi-culturalism is a defining hallmark of a CUNY education.

CHILDCARE FOR ALL STUDENTS WHO REQUEST IT

We believe that childcare should be a right not a privilege. However, under the current lottery system less than 50% of the students that require childcare on this campus can receive these services. Government funding is sparse, and insufficient to meet the overwhelming needs. It is imperative that new proposals be formulated in order to route more money into the childcare system.

STUDENT CONTROL OF STUDENT SPACE

The Club Commission has been advocating for clubs and other student organizations to be given preferential treatment concerning space on campus. The Green Dolphin Lounge and the Center For The Arts primary purpose should be to service the students here at CSI, not outside organizations. Additionally, we are advocating for permanent club rooms here at the college.

PARKING: UNFAIR TICKETING PRACTICES, AND SAFETY

Lack of parking and paved lots, exorbitant ticket and decal fees, booting of students' cars, and insufficient lighting in parking areas, are an absolute nightmare for the drivers on this campus. We need your support as we continue to exert pressure on our administration and Auxiliary Services to change parking policies to service the students here at CSI.

SHUTTLE BUS SERVICES

We have been hearing to many complaints regarding the scheduling and attitude of the shuttle bus service here at CSI. The intracampus transportation system needs to better service the daily needs of the student body. Students who commute by public transportation are under extreme duress, and our shuttle bus service only exacerbates the problem. Bus service must be accessible, reliable, comfortable, and friendly.

DEACREASE THE BUREAUCRACY

Administrative bureaucracy has plauged our clubs and student organizations by hindering us from the full college experience. We need to unite students and faculty together so that the process can be simplified. Events should be facilitated by responsible students who are aggressive in their activism, but tempered with diplomacy. This work necessitates that we work in conjunction with the student body and staff.

PART-TIME, WEEKEND AND EVENING STUDENTS

Our candidates have been committed to forming a more inclusive structure for this (oftentimes) neglected portion of our student body. We want to continue to target this population with programs like the Open House Forums, and services like the Free Evening Coffee Hours. We also need your support in this coming year as we fight for better advisement, more evening and weekend activities, and a larger class selection to benefit part time students.

LOWER PRICES FOR STUDENTS

With the support of our candidates, we launched a campaign to boycott our cafeteria when ordering Pizza for our student activities here on campus This resulted in Student Clubs getting a discount of \$5.75 a pie from our food services. Instead of turning profits, Auxiliary Services should be devoted to providing the best service at the cheapest prices. We are currently paying more for food, copies, and books in CSI than we would be paying outside the campus. This is inexcusable. Students should not be forced to pay top dollar. We intend to continue to mobilize students in serious campaigns to change the current practices.

WHAT IS THE PASS /FAIL OPTION?

The fact that the United Students slate is supporting the PASS/FAIL OPTION has stirred up quite a lot of curiosity. Students are asking what is a pass fail option, and why should anyone support this? To begin with, the P/F option is when a student is awarded the opportunity to take a limited amount of accredited matriculated classes that will be graded as either a pass or fail, instead of a letter grade.

There are a couple of major reasons why this would be such an advantage to our students here at CSI. To begin with, even the most intelligent and industrious people find it quite difficult to receive high grades in every subject. For instance,

students who major in the Liberal Arts venue (such as History, Psychology, Journalism, etc.) usually find the technical and scientific subjects to be stringent and difficult to fathom. Conversely, the "Hard Sciences" and Math majors are usually confounded by the abstract quality of literature and the unpredictable nature of the human factor.

Consequently. most students have problems receiving high grades on subjects that are outside of their forte. The P/F option would allow students who are forced to take subjects outside of their major, to save their grade point average from plummeting. Students are constantly complaining about that one or two subjects that plague them through their entire college career. The P/F option would alleviate the horrible stress that interferes with the quality of student life for the students who feel concerned about their GPA, and penalized for not being great at everything.

Another wonderful advantage of

the P/F option is that a student would have the opportunity to experiment with subjects that they would normally shy away from. I can't tell you how many times I wanted to expand my horizons by taking a class outside my field of interest that was not required. But I played it safe because I did not have the freedom to "play" with my grade point average. I believe this is true of most CUNY students who are aiming toward scholarships to continue their education.

Some skeptics might argue, especially the many critics of CUNY, that the P/F option would somehow lower the quality of education for our students. However, if you do your homework you will find out that almost all the "Ivy League" colleges offer this option to their students, and that it is CUNY that has an aversion to the P/F option. I believe that we deserve the same opportunities here at CSI, as others do. So join us in our struggle to afford our students with this beneficial option of education.

United Students Issues & Solutions

We at the Banner have asked representatives to elaborate on where the United Students slate stands on the issues; they have supplied a brief list of some of the problems within C.S.I and how they are going to address them.

Childcare

The first issue that we would like to discuss is childcare. If you have a child and go to C.S.I you may have already experienced the anxiety that comes with the lottery. We hope you feel lucky because you have a fifty-fifty chance of getting your child in. Childcare has been a problem since it was included to the school. Every semester only a small percentage of people who have children are allowed to use the childcare facility. This left a big demand for childcare for those left out in the rain. Many of these students then complain to student government who hands as of late have been tied by a tyrannical administration. They have tried to address this problem by using every diplomatic means at their disposal to no avail.

Our society has started to realize that many single mothers and fathers want to rejoin work force. There are many companies that now have childcare as one of their benefits to meet the demands of their work force. All Universities and Colleges acts as a microcosm of the society they exist in. With that in mind our members believe that childcare has gone from a students privilege to right. Our slate will pursue changes on behalf of the student body. The United Students slate proposes that the school investigate the option of looking

for other childcare facilities near the campus. By investigating the nearby facilities it would place us on the road to dealing with this problem rather then swiping it under the carpet as administration has done for many years now.

Parking

Another major problem on campus is parking and ticketing practices of campus security. Almost every student who has a car and parked on campus has had the fear of parking on the line. This creates the feeling that we are being rob by everyone administration, the bookstore, and the campus security. We are also given a twoweek grace period for parking on campus without a parking decal at the beginning of the semester. Once the two weeks are over, any student is fair game for a ticket for parking without a decal. It is not taken into consideration that you may have been a student for awhile and have purchased decals for prior semesters. Many students cannot afford to pay for a decal after purchasing all the books they need for the semester. However, administration does not take this into account.

Parking itself is a difficult task to perform in time to get to class. Why? Because, C.S.I sells many more parking permits than there are available spots. Their theory is that we'll sell the same amount of decal for "day students" as well as "night students". They assume that the daytime student leaves the campus the campus after a certain time during the day, which opens up available spots for the evening students. Administration tried to address this prob-

lem by creating the "gravel pit" between lots three and four but as members of student government later found out these parking spaces are illegal. Unfortunately, the New York City police department can ticket any one who parks in the "gravel pit".

The United Students slate proposes to alleviate this ongoing problem by investigating the possibility of paving over the grass dividers as well as putting a stop to on the line ticketing. Our slate also wishes to extend the grace period at the beginning of every semester.

Library Facility

Have you ever gone to look for a book and it's not there or look up a journal and the library doesn't carry it? We all have experienced the inadequate supply the library has. We the United Student Slate want to remedy this dilemma by increasing the libraries volume of books, journals, newspapers and videos. Many students find it frustrating to travel to several libraries, some of which require a great deal of time, in order to complete necessary research projects for their classes. Through the courtesy of the current student government we obtained information on the standing of our library compared to other CUNY libraries. Sadly, as it turns out we were second to the lowest on the list of CUNY book volume in our library. Being that we are a senior college we should have been the list, so as to set an example for the other colleges.

Career and Majors

College is supposed to be a time of learning and opportunity for all. We know what it is like to struggle for four or five years to achieve a degree, and end up working in McDonald's because there is no known available job. The students of the United Students slate feel that this is a major issue and it needs to be dealt with.

It is time for the College of Staten Island to offer more opportunities for graduating and soon-to-be graduating students to acquire information for jobs related to their majors. The United Students slate is dedicated to creating Student Government job fairs and dinners for the sole purpose of increased student exposure. Another idea is to enlist the aid and experience of members of the CSI Alumni, who are an untapped resource for students.

What's wrong with the Gym

Everyone who has ever used the gym has at one point said the same thing "If it wasn't free I wouldn't work out here". Some students feel that the gym, specifically the weight room has become dangerous. One student complained of poor ventilation, "Every time I workout there's at least an inch of dust siting under the trade mills and they keep closing the doors to keep people from walking in but I can hardly breathe".

Other problems with the gym are the missing, broken and lack of proper equipment. As an extremely concerned student noted "Handle straps are ripping and kill my hands when I use the machine. Then I come over here to use this machine and the equipment that was here yesterday ain't here today. The money from my activity fee goes to the gym right then how come I have to put up with this crap". As our decision continued his friend interjected "There are missing dumbbells, pins, and even handle grips on a machine. They should also have someone here to help people workout. 





This Season Dolphins Hope To Make A Big Splash

The team's strengths will be strong pitching, good defense, and excellent infield playing from the men's baseball team for the College of Staten Island. Last spring the team had had a 21-17 team effort. Hopefully the first five pitchers Frank Sansonetti, John Urrico, Frank Contino, Jorge Reyes, and Craig Sleap will be strong enough to compete in the conference" said coach Bill Cali. "We play a lot of games in our schedule" Cali added.

"Frank Sansonetti is the best athlete on the team, he is a senior, and leads the pitchers. He has the qualifications to be drafted into the major leagues. Depending on timing and work ethic Sansonetti looks very promising" said Cali. He has the ability to run, hit, throw, and pitch he does everything well. His batting average has been over 400 and two years ago he batted .509 which was 5th in the country. Last year his pitching record was 2-1."

"Frank Sansonetti and John Urrico will be on the mound to lead the pitching. Also Craig Sleap will be pitching and if he pitches the way he pitch last year it will be a good season" says Cali. The Dolphins top hitter is second basemen Mark Navarino, who hit. 310 last year. He is also captain and has started four years. Last year he had great games against John Jay with a triple that won the game and against Manhattanville with five runs batted in.

Playing with Navarino will be A1 Molina and Victor Romano at shortstop, they will share the position. Called on to hit beside Navarino will be Thomas Greco, third basemen Victor Castore, and outfielder Frank Sansonetti, outfielder Kenny Brown, and outfielder Anthony DiStefano. Thomas Greco will also be a relief pitcher "he has a good arm and very good speed" says Cali.

"Castore moves very well in the and this is his third year as a Dolphin. We moved him over from first base to play third base. He will be playing both first base and third base and will be on the line-up scheduled to play" added Cali. The team's only weakness may be their depth in pitching, but that remains to be seen. If they get some in depth pitching they have a chance to win the conference. The starting line-up is Tom Consolmagno outfielder, Mark Navarino second baseman, Frank Sansonetti pitcher/outfielder, Victor Castore third baseman, Tom Consolmagno outfielder, Chris Miliante outfielder, Michael Guarneri catcher, Victor Romano shortstop, and Anthony Avena will come in and contribute depending on who is pitching. "Anthony has been playing very well" added Cali.

The Dolphins also have Freshman Kenny Brown outfielder, Anthony DiStefano outfielder, they will be seeing playing time also. "Basically we are going to use everyone we have and AI Molina is going to get playing time as shortstop with Victor Romano the starting shortstop" said Cali. The Dolphins will compete in the City University of New York Athletic Conference and in the Knick College Conference. Last year they made it to the final of the ECAC Division III Tournament where they lost to Drew and made it to the finals of the Knick Conference where they lost to Mount St. Mary' s. And in the CUNY Championship lost to John Jay College.
